Live Free or Die

The Kilton Public Library in the small town of Lebanon, New Hampshire, is the nation's first library to install Tor, a software app that conceals the location and internet protocol addresses of persons who routinely contact the library via the internet.

Use of the software is not limited to connections between libraries and their members. It can be used to protect shoppers from identity theft, whistleblowers from retaliation, wives from abusive husbands and dissidents from opposers. On the other hand, Tor can mask the identity of swindlers, thieves, deviants and terrorists.

The Kilton Library's response to criticism of the Tor project was to say that the library was committed to the values of "intellectual privacy." Some have observed that Kilton is right in line with New Hampshire's motto: "Live Free or Die."

The American Library Association has a long history of fighting to protect library patrons' privacy. In 1953 it fought federal government efforts to track and regulate patrons' reading habits, and in the 1970s opposed federal efforts to identify patrons seeking information on how to construct homemade bombs. And recently, in the aftermath of Edward Snowden's revelations, libraries are speaking out against government acquisition of information.


A Message from Susan White President, Friends of the Pickens Library

Who Do You Trust?

There may be controversy about who first said, "There is a sucker born every minute," but in her new book Maria Konnikova advances the premise that we fall for confidence games every time. If you just scoffed, then you are just the audience Konnikova addresses in her book.

The Confidence Game, Why We Fall for It Every Time is among the new books at our library. Readers who think they are capable of detecting a con before they fall victim would do well to take a good look into this book. Those who are simply curious will be gratified.

A successful con is based upon belief. People who absolutely never trust, never believe, are rare. The rest are vulnerable to being taken by a Bernie Madoff or a beggar on the street.

Cheats and swindlers are a dime a dozen, the author says, but true confidence men true conmen—the Bernie Madoffs, the Jim Bakkers, the Lance Armstrongs—are elegant, outsized personalities, artists of persuasion and exploiters of trust. How do they do it? Why are they successful? And what keeps us falling for it, over and over again?

Konnikova explains the mechanics of the confidence game and the psychology of the victims —the act of believing. Not as a bonus, but as an integral part of her work, she also describes the research into the psychology of why deceptions continue to work.

Looking for Paradise—Go to the Library!

The etymology of the word paradise is from two Greek parts: *peri*, meaning around or about and *dheigh* meaning to construct. In early usage, it referenced an orchard or hunting park or the Garden of Eden. The word paradise came to indicate a beautiful, serene place that was walled in, unavailable to outside pressures, burdens, or distresses. It represented euphonious harmony where things were devoid of physical difficulties brought about by unnatural civilization, worldly pursuits, and selfish concerns.

Desiderius Erasmus (1466-1536) is considered the most influential member of the humanist movement. Erasmus, whose name means "beloved," was born to parents who died from the plague. He was placed into guardianship of people who sent him to school.

Clearly, his world-view was weighted by books and libraries. He became a Dutch priest and teacher who garnered high praise as a Renaissance scholar and lecturer. Not only was he a professor of Cambridge, he also authored one of the most significant societal satires, The Praise of Folly.

And it is Erasmus of Rotterdam who remarks: "Your library is your paradise."

A chipmunk scampering about for acorns,


Dew drops on a spider's web, sunrise over a salt marsh,

The Friends 2016 book sale will be held on October 28 and 29 at Chattahoochee Tech in Jasper.


A preview sale for members only will be held on October 27. So if you want to take advantage of a really, really good deal, make sure your membership is current, and for the best picks plan on arriving early.
