
From the Letters of a Connecticut Yankee

Pickens County's own, Ann K. Gunnin, is an author and researcher who will speak about her great-great-grandfather's collection of 160 Civil War letters that she edited for her book, Letters to Virtue. Virtue was married to Charles W. Sherman, the author of these reflections from the front. The book not only includes his letters, but also historical content concerning the activities and engagements of the regiment, daily life, generals and battles, and the politics concerning the nation's turmoil. Charles, who was born in England,

was stationed in Louisiana from 1862-1864, and served in the Shenandoah Valley Campaign in 1864.

The book received the Lulu Downey Cadwalader Award in 2016 from the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, and has received many favorable reviews including those in the Civil War News and The Civil War Monitor.

Brent Turbeville's Personal Testimony

Brent Turbeville, a newly recruited member of the board has written about how the library has affected his life.

My name is Brent Turbeville. I am a single dad and am truly blessed to have my son living with me. Believe it or not, I had a life-changing experience at the Pickens County Library. It was the summer before my son's first-grade year, and right about the same time he began living with me. He was behind in Kindergarten, and I honestly had no idea where to start to get him prepared and ready for first grade. I started an extensive search scouring the internet to find answers, but became overwhelmed with too much information. I found a lot of good stuff and used some of it, but after a while, it got to be boring for Cade and for me, too.

My son means the world to me and like any parent, I wanted to do whatever I could to improve his life. I worked to keep him interested in learning, but was out of ideas. On a chance, I decided to stop by the Pickens County Library. I explained my dilemma, and couldn't believe how everyone was so eager to help. I signed-up Cade for the Summer Reading Program and received a Summer Reading calendar. I left that day with the hope that he was eager to start reading again. At first, he was more interested in the big prizes he could win, but after a while, reading every day became a habit. He would ask me, "Are we going to read today?"

Cade and I are big buddies, and truly enjoy each other's company. I believe that taking that little extra time and sitting with him and reading together improved our relationship and brought us that much closer. It was our special one-on-one time together. He could not wait to go back to the library to pick out more books to read and then present his reading journal to the staff. He proudly announced how many books he had read. (125 books read by the end of that summer!)

Cade and I took advantage of the tons of scheduled events. There were special guests and free activities. By the end of the summer, Cade met new friends,



acclimated himself to his new surroundings, and was entertained by the activities at the library. We found that the reading he completed had prepared him for the first grade. In addition, the Summer Reading Program instilled a quest for reading and learning that encouraged him - not only to learn more, but to do more.

Cade continued to be a part of the Summer Reading Program up until his graduation from elementary school. He ended up making all A's on his report card in first grade, and has continued to do so since.

I am a firm believer in the impact local libraries can have, and am honored to be chosen to serve on the board. I encourage you to stop by your local library, pick up an activities' calendar, and get involved with all that the library offers. You will discover it is a place where anyone of any age can learn, socialize, get involved with the community and find answers.
